

# Working Families Early Education Entitlement for Two Year Olds

## **Sufficiency Assessment and Outcome**

How we decide whether there is sufficient existing childcare in Bradford to meet the increase in demand from April 2024.

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## Terminology

**Group-based Providers** – Early education and childcare providers registered with Ofsted or the Independent School Inspectorate and operating on non-domestic premises. (Includes Day Nurseries, Pre-school Playgroups, Childcare on Domestic premises providers, Independent School Nurseries, Schools with nursery classes and Nursery Schools.

**Childminders** – Early education and childcare providers registered with Ofsted or a childminding agency, they work in their own home, either alone or with assistants or with another childminder.


## 1. Introduction

From April 2024, working families with a child aged two will be entitled to 15 hours of funded childcare per week for up to 38 weeks a year. The funded childcare hours can be claimed from the term following the child's 2<sup>nd</sup> birthday. For example, a child aged 2 on the 31<sup>st</sup> of August will be able to claim hours from the Autumn term starting 1<sup>st</sup> September. Eligibility criteria for working families can be found <u>here</u>. Further working families entitlements are due to roll out in the future, however, this report focuses solely on April 2024.

In order to fulfil the local authority's statutory responsibility to ensure there are sufficient entitlement places for all eligible children, the local authority has assessed the supply and demand of childcare within Bradford. The main outcome of this assessment is to determine whether we develop new childcare places for two year olds. This report will outline the steps that have been taken to assess the childcare sector.



Below is a road map which outlines the processes of assessing supply and demand, in addition to how families claim funded childcare and how providers go about processing the claims. All of this is underpinned by how the local authority and the Department for Education (DfE) communicates with providers and families.



Road map outlining the local authorities steps in rolling out the April 2024 working families entitlement.

## 2. Data

#### a. Supply of places

Supply data on Bradford early education and childcare is held in the form of capacity – the maximum number of early education and childcare places that can be offered on a given day.

Capacity data is held for each early education and childcare provider for a set age range. For example, a day nursery provider will have a recorded capacity of 56 for 2 year olds meaning that they could accommodate 28 children in the morning session and 28 children in the afternoon session.

To update our capacity data, we sent out a survey to all providers excluding childminders. Childminder capacity was assessed by a separate piece of work that had recently been carried. Overall, we received 160 responses from 161 providers, meaning almost all our held capacity data could be updated.

### b. Demand for places

In order to assess demand for working families early education and childcare in Bradford, we used the existing number of children taking up the existing 3&4 year old working families 30 hours of funded childcare entitlement as a predictor. Using the percentage of 3&4 year old children taking up the working families' entitlement we calculated the estimated number of 2 year old children that would be likely to take up the entitlement. You can see in the table below the number predicted take up of the 2 year old entitlement for each ward.




It is important when viewing this demand data to understand that projected two year old take up does not mean that they are all new two year old children to the childcare market. The number of two year old's taking up the new entitlement will include children who are already are accessing paid-for two year old childcare, and children accessing an eligible disadvantaged/low income two year old place. However, from April 2024 a portion of these two year olds will be eligible for the working families' entitlement, therefore not increasing the demand for additional childcare.

#### c. Vacancies for places

In order to establish unmet demand and highlight areas where demand may exceed supply, we collected vacancy data for all providers through a survey. The survey asked the below questions.

- i. Please select your Setting's name from the drop down below.
- ii. Do you have any vacancies for children aged 2 for the term after their 2nd birthday?
- iii. How many vacancies for 2 year olds do you have?
- iv. What type of vacancies are available?
- v. When do you expect to have vacancies?
- vi. Do you receive enquiries for 2 year old early education and childcare from parents which you are having to turn away?
- vii. Would you consider expanding your setting to enable you to offer more early education and childcare places for 2 year olds?



Group-based providers response when asked if they have vacancies for two year olds. Snapshot from 09/04/2024.





For childminders, there were 51 responses 249 with childminders from all wards responding. Of the 51 that responded, 34 have no vacancies and 17 have vacancies. Therefore, of the survey respondents, 33% of childminders have vacancies.

For group-based providers, there were 113 responses out of 158 with providers from all wards responding. Of the 113 providers that responded, 18 have no vacancies and 95 have vacancies. Therefore, of the 113 respondents, 84% of group-based providers have vacancies.

For childminders, there were 51 responses 249 with childminders from all wards responding. Of the 51 that responded, 34 have no vacancies and 17 have vacancies. Therefore, of the survey respondents, 33% of childminders have vacancies. You can see charts of the data below.

## 3. Sufficiency Outcome

Data analysis was carried out using all the data shown in section 2. From this analysis, we identified three wards where there was a potential for shortfall of early education and childcare places. These wards were Bingley, Wharfedale and Worth Valley. The data showed that the remaining wards had sufficient places. More detailed analysis was conducted on the three potential shortfall wards using geographical data and cross-border information. The result of this more detailed analysis showed that the three wards would have sufficient childcare places for the April 2024 rollout. However, Worth Valley would require close monitoring following the rollout and across the upcoming additional working families' entitlement.

Therefore, the local authority's sufficiency outcome is: for April 2024 we expect demand for childcare to increase **BUT** we predict that **the existing supply of childcare will meet this demand**.



## 4. Next steps

- We will continue to monitor the two year old childcare sector following the rollout of the April 2024 15 hours of funded childcare for working families with a two year old child.
- In September 2024 the working families entitlement will be expanded to include children over the age of 9 months. The following work will be carried out in preparation for this
  - Under 2s vacancy survey will be sent out to providers at the end of March/start of April. This vacancy survey will be more comprehensive, asking questions about demand, physical space and willingness to expand physical capacity.
  - Latest spring eligibility codes claimed for 2 and 3&4 year old working families entitlement will be used to predict demand for 9 months working families entitlement.
  - In the lead up to the September 2024 we will be hosting a webinar for providers to give information about the new entitlement and its rollout.
- In September 2025 the final rollout of working families entitlement will be complete with 30 hours of funded childcare 9 months to school age for working families. All our current and future supply and demand analysis is contributing to our preparation for September 2025.
