

Applying for Secondary School

September 2016

A step-by-step guide for parents of children moving on from primary to secondary school in September 2016



This booklet is for parents of children born between 1 September 2004 and 31 August 2005 who will be moving on to secondary school. The application process starts in September when your child is in year 6.

This booklet provides a summary of how to apply for a secondary school place for September 2016. Full details of the admission arrangements for all our schools and academies can be found on the Bradford Council website www.bradford.gov.uk

Save time – apply online!

It's safe

your child is given a unique identification number (UID)



It's quick

using the UID, the system will automatically fill in your child's details for you

It's available

24 hours a day, seven days a week from 7 September 2015 until the closing date on 31 October 2015

- you will get an email to confirm that we have received your application
- you can log in at any time (may be unavailable 6pm Sunday to 6am Monday) and make changes up to the closing date
- you will get an email on 1 March 2016 to tell you which school your child has been offered.

Different types of schools = different admission rules

Academies and free schools: The majority of Secondary schools in the Bradford district are academies or free schools. These schools are funded directly by the Department for Education and governors make decisions. Many academies have a priority admission area which can be viewed on the Council website, at the schools or at Future House. The Dixons Academies and Bradford Girls' Grammar School require parents to complete a supplementary form in order to register for an assessment which is used to place applicants in ability bands. Feversham College requires parents to also fill in a supplementary form in order for the faith policy to be applied to applications.

Community schools: The local authority provides the funding and also makes decisions. There are currently two community schools, Carlton Bolling and Titus Salt. All community schools

have priority admission areas.

Foundation schools: The local authority provides the funding and school governors make decisions. There are two Foundation schools – Laisterdyke and Oakbank (Oakbank has a priority admission area).

Trust schools: The local authority provides the funding and school governors make decisions. Buttershaw, Parkside, Queensbury, Thornton and Tong are Trust schools and have priority admission areas.

Voluntary-aided schools: The local authority provides the funding and school governors make decisions. All VA schools (except Bingley Grammar) are Catholic or Church of England schools and parents must complete a supplementary form if applying on faith grounds.

Changes

- Feversham College now requires parents to fill in a supplementary form as part of the application process. This must be returned to the school direct, by the 31 October 2015.
- Beckfoot Upper Heaton is the new name for Belle Vue Boys which closed on 31 August 2015 and re-opened on

1 September 2015 as an academy as part of the Beckfoot Trust, joining Beckfoot and Hazelbeck School. The school is co-educational from September 2015, admitting both boys and girls.

Step 1

How do I decide which schools to apply for?

You should collect as much information as possible about the schools in your area, especially their admission procedures. You can do this by:

- visiting the Bradford Council website, www.bradford.gov.uk where you can find:
 - full details of all schools' admission arrangements in the 'Guide for Parents';
 - last year's allocation figures for each secondary school;
 - School Finder' - a map giving the details of schools in the Bradford Authority near to your postcode.
- going to secondary school open evenings in September and October and talking to your child about how they feel about each school;
- viewing the school websites or their prospectus for information on what each school can offer;
- contacting the Choice Adviser, based at Barnard's Bradford Parent Partnership, for independent advice;
- visit the Ofsted website www.ofsted.gov.uk where you can read the latest Ofsted reports.

Step 2

How do I apply?

Be realistic

Many schools are oversubscribed and receive more applications than they have places to offer. Even if you live within a Priority Area, you may not qualify for a place if 'distance criteria' is part of the admissions policy. The number of secondary students competing for places is increasing every year and the fact that a neighbour was offered a place before does not mean you can rely on a place being allocated this year. We strongly advise you use all five preferences and preference all the schools whose Priority Area you may be in to maximise your chances of being offered a locally accessible school

Make your preferences count

If you only apply for one school your child will only be considered for that one school. If you do not qualify for a place, you will be allocated a school with an available space after all allocations have been made, this may not be local and could involve several bus journeys. You will only be able to appeal for the school you have applied for and you will only be able to add your child's name to the waiting list of the school you chose or other undersubscribed schools. Last year, nearly 95% of children were offered one of their preferred schools.

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Step 2 How do I apply? (continued)

Application forms

- You need to apply to the local authority where your child lives (your home council). If your child lives in the Bradford District, you should apply online on the Council's website, www.bradford.gov.uk/admissions.
- Applying online is the best way to apply. If you have been sent a Unique Identification number (UID) when you apply online all your child's details will already be completed from our database. This makes the application quicker and easier. If you aren't sent a UID or have lost it, you can still apply online but it will take a little longer to input the details.
- If you apply online you will receive the offer of a school place on 1st March, by email and will not have to wait for the postal service.
- If you are unable to apply online a paper application form will be available from your child's primary school or from the Admissions Team (if your child attends school in another Local Authority). This form must be returned to the primary school or to the Admissions Team to the address on the form and this booklet. **You must apply online by 31 October 2015 and if you apply by form it must be handed in or received by post by 31 October.** If you return the form by post to the Admissions Team we are unable to verify if it has been received and advise that you hand it in or send it recorded delivery.
- You can apply for any school in the Bradford district or outside the district except fee-paying schools. You should find out about the admission arrangements for each school.
- Where the child lives with separated parents who both have shared responsibility you must both agree which address to use before you make the application and agree on the preferences, otherwise the Local Authority will decide which address should be used and allocate a school with a place, after all other allocations.
- You must confirm that you have parental responsibility and that the information you have given is accurate. If you give deliberately false or misleading information or withhold important information that could affect your application, it may result in the place offered being withdrawn. You would then need to apply again, possibly after all allocations have been made, and legal action may be taken.

Supplementary forms and supporting letters

- Feversham College will require you to fill in a supplementary form for the first time when applying in September 2015. If you are applying for other schools for faith reasons, you must also fill in the school's supplementary form which is available on our website or from the school. You will need to fill in a supplementary form for each school you apply to for a faith place and return them to the school by **31 October 2015** with any supporting evidence required by the school.
- If you are applying for the Dixons Academies or Bradford Girls' Grammar School (BGGs), your child will need to sit a 'fair banding' assessment. This is because their admission policies state that their pupils must come from a wide ability range, so all applicants need to take an assessment to divide them into different ability bands. The schools then admit the required number from each band based on the spread of ability of those applying.
- To register for the assessment you must fill in Dixons Academies' own application forms by 3.30pm on **25 September 2015**, and by **31 October 2015** for BGGs. This is in addition to listing these schools on the common application form.
- If you wish to apply for Skipton Girls High School you must register for the tests by **16 September 2015**. For North Halifax Grammar and Crossley Heath Grammar School (Halifax) you must register by **13 September 2015**. The closing date for Ermysteds Boy's Grammar School was **14 August 2015**.
- Looked after children or those who were previously looked after but ceased to be because they were adopted or became subject to a residency order or special guardianship order are given priority in every admissions policy. You will need to provide evidence of this to the Admissions Team by the closing date, if you are applying for this priority.
- Some schools give priority to children who have **significant medical or social needs** which can only be met by a specific school. If you are applying on these grounds, you must provide written evidence from a hospital consultant or paediatrician, or a relevant professional for social grounds. The evidence must explain why it is the only school that could meet your child's needs and why no other schools can. Please read each school's policy as not all schools give priority.

Step 3 How do you deal with my application?

- Each school has a Published Admissions Number (PAN), which is the number of children that will be offered a place. Each school has its own admission policy and these will be different depending on the school and the type of school. The policy or rules determine which children are offered places. For

most secondary schools, children with older brothers or sisters attending the school who live within the 'priority area' are given some priority and then children who live within the 'priority area'; next, those children with siblings living outside the priority area

and lastly those who live outside the priority area without siblings.

It is very important that you read the policies and the 'Priority Areas' for the schools that you are applying to, in order to understand whether your child may be offered a place. In addition you can find out the distance the last child was offered a place in the previous year by looking at the 'Guide for Parents 2016-2017'. Full details are available on each school's website as well as the Council website.

- **If you apply online you will receive an email to confirm that you have submitted your application successfully. If you decide to change your application you can log back in and do so but you must ensure that you 'resubmit' your application and you will receive another email confirming your new preferences.**
- If you have applied for community schools we look at the applications and apply the Council's policy to decide which applicants will be offered a place, considering any supporting evidence provided. If you have applied for any other type of school we will inform them of the application and they will tell us if a place can be offered, taking into account any evidence provided or the supplementary form, if one is required.
- It is important that you understand if you are applying for a school that operates a 'fair banding' policy or
- **random allocation, as this means that you are unable to have any idea if your child will be offered a place based on previous years, priority areas or distance. If you choose five preferences that operate this kind of policy you may not be offered any of your preferences and we may offer you a place at an undersubscribed school, some distance from your home. We advise you to seriously consider preferencing a local school or your 'Priority area' school(s) to ensure you maximise your chances of being offered one of your preferences.**
- **There are many myths around the order in which you preference your schools.** No school policy operates first preference first. Only the Admissions Team know which order you have preferenced your schools, each preference is treated separately to see if you can be offered a place in any or all of your preferenced schools. If your child can be offered more than one school, the order in which you have made your preferences enables us to offer you the highest preferenced school, for which you qualify.
- **You will receive an email on 1st March, if you applied online.** You will also receive a letter confirming the school that your child has been allocated. If you did not apply online, you will only receive the letter. All letters will be handed out in all Bradford Primary schools, to Bradford residents, informing you of your child's allocated schools on 1st March 2016. Letters will be posted to Bradford children attending school outside the authority.

Step 4 What if I miss the deadline or want to change my preferences?

- **Before decisions about offers are made**

The closing date for you to apply is **31 October 2015**. If we receive your application after this date, it will only be considered if we receive it before decisions about offers of a place are made (the beginning of December) and where there are exceptional circumstances, such as a house move. We are also unable to accept changes to your preferences unless there are exceptional changes in your circumstances.
- **After decisions about offers are made**

If we receive your application late and after we have made decisions, we will only consider it after all those returned on time unless:

 - There are exceptional circumstances as previously described; or
 - The late application or change of preference is for an undersubscribed school (a school with unfilled places)

If you have already applied for five schools, we will not accept any other preferences, changes of preference or additional preferences, except for the reasons above. However, you can apply after 1st September 2016 for an 'in year application'.
- **Moving house**

If you have recently moved house, you must send us proof of your new address. This would need to be a council tax, gas, electricity or phone bill, or a child allowance or benefit document in your name or that of your child.

When considering applications we use the 'child's permanent address at the time of admission'. If you expect to move by September but you are still living at your current address when you apply, we can only consider your application from the new address if you provide the following documents:

 - Proof of exchange of contracts on your new property and a solicitor's letter to confirm the sale of your previous property; or
 - A rental agreement on the new property and confirmation of the sale or ending of your tenancy agreement for the previous property.

We will not accept mortgage offers or letters from estate agents as proof. If your house purchase or rental has not reached a stage where you can provide these documents by 23 November 2015, we will consider your application from your current address. However, it is important that you tell us if you move house at any time as it could affect your child's allocation.

Step 5

What if I don't get the school I want?

- If we are unable to give you any of your preferred schools, we will offer your child another school with an available place. This may include faith schools and single-sex schools. We decide which is the most appropriate school, taking into consideration all children without a school place and available bus routes. If you do not apply for a local school and it becomes full, it is likely that the nearest school that we can offer will be some distance from your home. We can only offer an alternative school that has places available after all applications for that school have been considered.
- You can ask for your child's name to go on a waiting list for any schools that you applied for. Your child cannot be placed on a waiting list for a school that you did not apply for unless there is a significant change in your circumstances (for example, you move house) or exceptional circumstances. If any places become available, they will be filled in line with the admission policy and not how long the name has been on the list. Most schools' waiting lists will close on 31 December 2016.
- You can make a formal appeal to an independent appeal panel, for any school that you have applied for. This is a legal process and places are not 'reserved' for appeal panels to offer children. Every appeal granted adds an additional child to the school over the Published Admissions Number (PAN) as the year group will be already full. The Panel will consider all the circumstances and issues that you include in your appeal, either verbally or in writing. Whilst the Independent Appeal Panel will listen to all cases and circumstances, there is not a checklist of circumstances that you must meet. However it is usually the most exceptional cases that are granted places. You can get appeal forms from the Admissions Team for most schools except Bingley Grammar, Dixons Academies and Oakbank. For these schools you must contact the schools direct for an appeal form. For schools in other local authorities, you must contact the relevant local authority.

We urge you to accept a place at the school you have been offered – it will not affect your chances of getting a place at your preferred school either from the waiting list or at appeal. You could also risk your child having no school place in September.

Step 6

Financial help

School Meals and Clothing

Bradford Council no longer provides a school clothing allowance for low income families. Bradford schools have now taken on the responsibility for providing parents with support for this where appropriate. How schools provide this support will vary from school to school so parents should contact the allocated school for more information.

If your child attends a tax-payer funded school and you live in the Bradford district you may be able to get free school meals. Families should apply if they get any of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income Based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income Related Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit with an annual income of less than £16,190, provided you are not receiving Working Tax Credit
- The 'Guaranteed' element of the State Pension Credit
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4-weeks after you stop qualifying for 'Working Tax Credit')
- Universal Credit

You should make your application after you have received your allocated school place.

The Journey to School

Changes to assistance with travel from home to school. The Travel Policy for home to school and college is changing. The Council has removed most of the discretionary assistance it previously provided including, to those schools attended on the basis of belief or lack of belief, the "at no extra cost" criterion, the "straight line" criterion and those children who may have historically been provided with assistance may not now be entitled to it.

The Council is also looking at how it can deliver transport differently to those with additional needs.

Children starting a new school from September 2016 or applying for school travel for the first time will be assessed using the new policy. The new policy, along with the current policy, can be found at www.bradford.gov.uk/bmdc/education_and_skills/schools/school_transport/school_travel_policy.htm

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Step 6 Financial help (continued)

Assistance with travel to school will be made only to the nearest available school to your home, otherwise assistance will not normally be provided. We consider all schools in relation to your home address which include those that are outside the Bradford District. "Priority admission areas" used in the admission process are not taken into consideration, neither is any distinction made between single sex and co-educational schools.

Unsafe routes to school

Many routes that were previously categorised as unsafe were not taken into account when measuring the distance to school. The Council is reviewing all of its unsafe routes to school. Over many years improvements have been made to the highway system including new pavements, traffic calming, crossing facilities and speed reductions.

All routes now designated safe will be removed from the Council list. This may impact on who will qualify for free travel to school as the measured distance may now be shorter and less than the qualifying distance for assistance.

Fares and passes

Reduced fares are available to pupils in full-time education travelling on all trains and most buses displaying the Metro symbol.

- 11 to 16 year olds can pay half fare if they buy a Young Person's PhotoCard.
- 16 to 18 year olds can pay half fare if they buy a Scholar's PhotoCard.
- Five to 18 year olds can buy a School Plus Metro Card for travel on most buses (but not trains) at any time of the day including evenings and weekends.

How and when to apply

Complete the application form that best meets your child's circumstances. You can download one from the Bradford Council website, or request one from the School Travel Team. Most people apply when they have their school place confirmed. Application forms should be returned by the last Friday in May in order for us to process your application for the term starting in September.

The assessment process

We determine your nearest 'suitable qualifying school' with places available at the time of allocation. If you apply outside of this time, because for example you move address; we will determine it at the time of the application. We then consider the needs of your child and the qualifying criteria set out in the Council's "Policy Covering Travel Between Home, School And College". The following is a very brief outline.



Children below the age of eight may qualify for assistance with travel if they live over two miles walking distance from the nearest school with places. For children age eight and above the walking distance is three miles. We measure the distance along a safe walking route accompanied as necessary by an adult.

If you choose a school based on your religion or belief (or your 'lack of belief') this will no longer be taken into account when considering an application for assistance with travel to school. Assistance will only be given to the nearest school with a place available. There remains some limited provision for children from low income families.

Extra entitlement for children from low-income families

Children from low-income families are those who are entitled to free school meals or whose parents receive the highest level of Working Tax Credit. Assistance with travel is given to one of their three nearest schools between two and six miles from their home. Once eligible for assistance with travel because of low income, any change to income in that year will not affect your child's entitlement to assistance for the rest of the school year. Other changes, such as a house move or school may however affect your child's eligibility for assistance.

Entitlement for children with additional needs

Children who are unable to walk to school because of their special educational needs, disability or temporary medical position may qualify for assistance. The Council is working with parent groups, schools and SEND professionals to change the way we deliver school travel for children with additional needs.

You will need to give full details on the application form and your application must be supported by specialist advice relating to the medical or behavioural needs of your child and after consultation from the school and other agencies involved in your child's well being.

Travel provision

If your child qualifies, we will usually give them a pass to travel free on the bus or train for one journey to and from school each day. If your child has additional needs and is unable to travel by bus or train, we may provide dedicated or specialist transport.
