**Funding available to alternative provision (AP) schools and colleges to support current year 11 students into post-16 education.**

### Fund Information

Funding body:	Department for Education (DfE)
Maximum value:	Discretionary
Application deadline:	15/03/2022

### Background

This funding is a one-off allocation in response to schools' limited opening to some pupils due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak.

### Objectives of Fund

The Department for Education (DfE) is providing one-off funding to fund additional transition support provided by Alternative Provision (AP) settings for year 11 pupils from now to the end of February 2022.

The AP cohort, a significant proportion of whom are in year 11, are already vulnerable and at greater risk of becoming not in education, employment or training (NEET) than their peers. These risks have increased since schools closed for most pupils and without substantial transition support. Bespoke, needs-based interventions are needed to support these year 11 pupils transition to post-16 provision successfully.

It is up to post-16 providers how they use this funding to support disadvantaged students, and to help retain students.

The DfE encourage the AP to engage with the further education sector to help ensure ex-AP pupils sustain their post-16 destinations and avoid becoming NEET. DfE also strongly encourage AP settings to work with commissioners, whether local authorities or schools, and other local organisations including the voluntary and community sector, to put in place effective intervention packages. Interventions should draw on evidence-based practice wherever possible and be based on pupils' individual needs, matched with the best locally available provision.

### Value Notes

The DfE will provide AP settings with **up to £750** for each year 11 pupil on their school or college roll, to support these young people to transition into sustained post-16 destinations and to avoid becoming NEET.

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AP's can use this one-off funding from now until the end of February 2022 depending on individuals' needs.

Funding will be allocated to cover actual costs of activities undertaken up to these per-year-11 student limits:

- Sole-registered: £750
- Dual-registered (either main or subsidiary): £375

The DfE will only cover the additional costs actually incurred, up to the limits, when putting in place additional intervention packages to mitigate the increased risks of year 11 pupils unsuccessfully transitioning to post-16 provision.

Applicants can pool funding with other APs to create shared activities. Each school will need to claim for funding separately and each individual claim must not exceed the funding limits determined by the cohort.

## Who Can Apply

Funding will only be available to the following settings with a year 11 AP cohort (sole or dual-registered):

- Pupil referral units (PRUs)
- Alternative provision academies and free schools
- Further education colleges offering alternative provision (these providers will need to pre-apply to access this funding)
- Registered independent schools offering alternative provision (these providers will need to pre-apply to access this funding)
- Hospital schools, including those that are PRUs, AP or special academies, foundation or community special schools, and those registered as independent schools.

England

## Restrictions

Funding is not available to:

- Special schools - unless they operate as a hospital school
- Charities - including those known as unregistered AP - that provide activities for pupils who are in AP settings - contact local APs to see how you could engage with their transition work
- Mainstream schools.

This funding is not for:

- Extending or re-opening school
- Providing additional school places or high needs funding
- Driving lessons
- Leavers' assemblies
- Laptops
- Exams
- Transport for pupils
- Sports day trophies.

APs wishing to keep pupils on roll would need to negotiate this separately with commissioners.

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## Eligible Expenditure

The DfE expect school and college leaders to identify the most effective and best value solution(s) available locally to support their year 11 cohort into post-16 settings.

This could include:

- Backfilling a staff member as a 'transition specialist' to organise activities and act as a mentor/advocate for year 11 pupils over the summer and/or during the autumn term
- Extending the contract of existing 'transition coaches' or appointing new ones
- Engaging third sector organisations to provide engagement activities and/or expand existing transition programmes
- Providing some level of on-site support for the most at-risk pupils during the autumn term and preparing them for January entry into further education.

Schools and colleges can fund activities tailored to an individual pupil or can pull together the funding into a package that supports wider groups of year 11s.

AP's planning an intervention that is very different from those in the guidance can email [APTransitionFund.COVID-19@education.gov.uk](mailto:APTransitionFund.COVID-19@education.gov.uk) to discuss eligibility.

## How To Apply

Changes are being made to the way schools and colleges will need to submit a claim. The Fund will no longer be asking schools and colleges to return individual claim forms to the AP Transition Fund mailbox. Instead, it will now be use a digital claim form to simplify and speed up the end of payment process.

The digital claim form will be available after spring half-term and will need to be completed by 15 March 2022.

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## Amal Connects Grants Programme

Grants are available to support a variety of high-quality arts and cultural activities that aim to increase understanding of Muslim communities among secular people or people of other faiths and foster a stronger sense of belonging among Muslim communities in Birmingham and Bradford.

### Fund Information

Funding body:	Amal
Maximum value:	£ 25,000

### Background

Amal began in 2017 as a grant-making programme of the Saïd Foundation. In 2020, Amal was established independently as a Muslim-led charity committed to bringing about wider-reaching change and to working sustainably over the long term.

The Amal Connects programme follows a co-creation, place-based model to grow the creative potential of the UK's Muslim communities. The programme currently covers Birmingham and Manchester with London and Manchester to be added over the next two to three years.

### Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to support a rich diversity of arts projects and activities, including storytelling, visual arts, theatre, poetry, film, music and dance.

Funding will support the following objectives:

- To increase understanding of Britain's Muslim communities among secular people or people of another faith.
- To foster a stronger sense of belonging in the UK among its Muslim communities.

Projects need to take place in Birmingham and/or Bradford.

## Value Notes

Grants of up to £25,000 for up to one year are available.

In the longer-term, the Trust expects to support projects over a longer period.

## Who Can Apply

Applications will be considered from:

- Registered UK charities which are:
  - Arts, cultural and educational organisations (eg, art centres, museums, galleries, performing arts, spaces and companies, heritage organisations, etc).
  - Established community groups.
  - Other not-for-profits.
- Local authority cultural organisations.
- Schools.
- Community Interest Companies, Companies Limited by Guarantee and potentially other kinds of company or partnership.

## Location

Birmingham and/or Bradford.

## Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Individuals (however individual artists are encouraged to apply in partnership with a host organisation or venue).
- Religious organisations that proselytise or make access to their community services conditional on religious practice.
- Appeals.
- Capital/building/endowment costs.
- Organisational (as opposed to project) running and staff costs.
- Retrospective funding.
- Projects outside the UK.
- Proposals that benefit only one individual.
- Debt repayment.
- Activities related to or promoting political parties or their programmes.

## Eligible Expenditure

Funding is intended for project costs for high-quality arts and cultural activities which fulfil all of the following criteria:

- Meet one or both of Amal's objectives and abide by the spirit of its values.
- Take place in Birmingham and/or Bradford.
- It has been or will be co-created with a group of Muslim-majority participants and the concerns and aspirations of the group are placed at the centre of the project creation and delivery process.
- It is a high-quality arts and cultural activity which involves creative professionals from predominantly Muslim backgrounds in the design and delivery of the project.
- It engages a significant number of participants through the life cycle of the project.

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Priority will be given to projects that would advance one or more of the following:

- Provide opportunities for encounters between individuals or groups of people who may not usually have such opportunities.
- Provide opportunities to platform work made by Muslim communities and Muslim artists to be seen and shared across different venues/locations.
- Work with communities that have had very limited opportunities for creative participation.
- Reflect diversity among the project's participants (such as gender and disability).
- Engage participants under the age of 30.
- Produce associated resources or media content to extend the reach of the project.
- Leverage Amal's grant to secure additional funding from other sources.

## How To Apply

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis until the scheme closes for the year on 31 July 2022.

There is a two-stage application process:

- Stage One requires applicants to complete an online expression of interest form.
- If successful in Stage One, applicants will be contacted to discuss their proposal further and asked to complete a longer Stage Two application form if necessary.

Guidance notes and an online expression of interest form are available from the Amal website.

The funder will respond within six weeks of receipt of the stage one applications.

**The Trust exists to fund projects that allow disadvantaged young people in the UK to take up opportunities to develop an existing interest in the great outdoors and outdoor activities.**

### **Fund Information**

Funding body:	The Andy Fanshawe Memorial Trust

### **Background**

The Andy Fanshawe Memorial Trust is a charity which was set up in memory of Andy Fanshawe, one of Britain's leading mountaineers at the time of his death in 1992.

### **Objectives of Fund**

The Trust offers funding to support disadvantaged young people to further develop an existing interest in adventurous outdoor activities such as walking, climbing, cycling, kayaking, sailing, horse riding in the UK. The Trust usually supports individuals or small groups.

### **Value Notes**

No minimum and maximum levels of support are outlined by the Trust. Instead, each project will be judged and awarded on merit.

Each year the Trust gives eight to twelve grants averaging £400 each.

### **Match Funding Restrictions**

Applicants are expected to have done some fundraising for the activity or adventure.

## Who Can Apply

Applications are accepted from individual young people or small groups or from organisations, such as schools or youth clubs, on behalf of a young person for self-planned activities or residential courses at an outdoor centre in the UK. To be eligible, individual applicants must provide a reference from a teacher or care-worker.

## Location

United Kingdom

## Restrictions

Funding is not available for the following:

- Taster sessions, one-off trips, or residential trips for large groups.
- Environmental organisations, unless there is a strong element of adventure.
- Foreign trips.
- Capital projects.
- Equipment for group activities. (The Trust will consider funding equipment if it is for an individual who is showing long-term commitment to his/her activity.)

## Eligible Expenditure

Funding is available for projects that allow disadvantaged young people to take up opportunities to further develop their interest in the great outdoors. Mostly, the Trust is looking to support young people with enthusiasm, initiative and a sense of adventure.

Eligible activities can be self-planned by the applicant or a residential course at an outdoor centre and might include outdoor activities such as walking, climbing, cycling, kayaking, sailing, horse riding etc. Activities must include an element of adventure, and applicants must be prepared to write a short report following their adventure.

## How To Apply

Applications can be made at any time and should be submitted via email in no more than 1,000 words.

Applications should include the following:

- Who is applying?
- What does the project propose to do, and where and when?
- Who will benefit? Why do they deserve the Trust's support?
- What experience does the applicant have of the activity so far?
- How will the funding help the applicant develop their interest further?
- What are the applicant's plans for continuing to progress their interest?
- What fundraising is being done or is planned?
- What is the overall budget?
- How much is being applied for?

If an individual is applying for a grant, a reference should be obtained from a teacher or care worker.

## Background

The Arnside & Silverdale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Grants Fund is run by Arnside & Silverdale AONB Partnership and the Arnside/Silverdale Landscape Trust, working together.

## Objectives of Fund

The aim of the scheme is to conserve and enhance the AONB or connect people with the landscape.

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## Value Notes

Grant awards will normally be in the range of £100 to £2,500.

Grants of over £2,500 may be awarded in exceptional circumstances.

## Match Funding Restrictions

Although match funding or in-kind voluntary support is not essential, it is likely to increase the chances of a successful application.

## Who Can Apply

Applications will be considered from:

- Community groups.
- Schools.
- Businesses.
- Partner organisation.
- Parish councils.
- Landowners and managers.
- Individuals.

The organisation must have a bank account and, if the applicant is a community group or charity, formal terms of reference.

## Location

Arnside & Silverdale AONB area

## Restrictions

Funding will not be awarded to the following:

- Projects that are eligible for funding through Countryside Stewardship.
- Rent, salaries or projects where there is the likelihood of financial reward for those managing the project.
- Projects that commence before an offer of a grant is made by the panel.
- Repeat or annual applications for the same project unless in exceptional circumstances or where there has been a significant change in circumstances.

## Eligible Expenditure

The funding is for projects that:

- Are located within, or demonstrate clear links to the Arnside & Silverdale AONB.
- Conserve and enhance the AONB and/or enable people to connect with the landscape.
- Contribute to the delivery of the Arnside & Silverdale AONB Management Plan (downloadable from the AONB website).
- Are consistent with the constitution of the Arnside/Silverdale Landscape Trust.

The following types of projects will be considered:

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- Protect the flora and fauna of the Arnside & Silverdale AONB.
  - Restore, enhance or create wildlife habitat or benefit priority species.
  - Enhance, restore and improve understanding of ecological networks in the AONB.
  - Improve or enhance the coast or seascape.
  - Restore cultural or historic features or assets.
  - Develop the AONB as a sustainable tourism destination.
  - Improve opportunities for people to access and enjoy the area, especially for those who may not otherwise have the opportunity to do so.
  - Promote greater understanding of the area and encourage appropriate recreational opportunities.
  - Research, interpret, celebrate or raise awareness of the special qualities of the area; its nature, history or culture.
  - Connect people (particularly young people and children) with the landscape.
  - Promote participation in traditional rural skills.
  - Involve the local community or volunteers.
  - Support local communities in moving towards sustainable low carbon living.

## Background

Arts Council England has created National Lottery Project Grants as an open-access programme for arts, museums and libraries projects.

## Objectives of Fund

This grants programme is intended to help the Arts Council deliver its new strategy, 'Let's Create'. It also provides a means to support a broad range of not-for-profit projects that create and sustain quality work and help people across England to engage with arts and culture.

The programme supports development by allowing artists, cultural practitioners and organisations to work in new ways and to get their work out to new audiences.

## Value Notes

Grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 are available.

The funding can support projects lasting up to a maximum of three years.

## Match Funding Restrictions

Match funding of at least 10% is required.

## Who Can Apply

Individual artists and community and cultural organisations can apply.

To be eligible, applicants (individual or organisation) must:

- Be based within (live in or have a business address in) England or the wider UK.
- Have a UK bank account in the exact name they are applying in.
- Be at least 18 years old (for organisations: have an accountable person who is at least 18).

The following information is for organisations:

- 
- Organisations refers to a group of people working towards a common goal with a governing document that covers the type of project being applied. This could be, for example, a charity, a limited company or an unincorporated group. Examples would be arts organisations, museums, libraries, Music Education Hubs, and organisations that use the arts in their work.
  - All organisations need to have a bank account in the organisation's name, with two signatories.
  - Limited companies and registered charities need to have a registered office in the UK.

Applications will be accepted from organisations working as a consortium, partnership, network or group. For non-constituted consortiums or groups, one organisation must act as the lead organisation and submit the application. If the application goes on to be successful, this organisation would then be accountable for the grant.

## Location

England

## Restrictions

The grants cannot be used to fund costs that have already occurred (retrospective funding) or losses (debt mitigation).

A full list of restrictions applying to the different types of organisations eligible for grants can be found in the guidance notes.

## Eligible Expenditure

The grants programme supports a broad range of creative and cultural projects that benefit people living in England. Projects can range from directly creating and delivering creative and cultural activity to projects which have a longer term positive impact, such as organisational development, research and development and sector support and development.

The funding is for projects that are focused on one or more of the following disciplines:

- Music.
- Theatre.
- Dance.
- Visual arts.
- Literature.
- Combined arts - including festivals and carnivals.
- Museum practice (accredited or unaccredited).
- Libraries (for activities that deliver against at least one of the Universal Library Offers including: Creativity and Culture; Reading; Information and Digital; Health and Wellbeing).

Support is also available for a range of other types of work, provided projects **clearly focus** on one or more of the disciplines the Arts Council can support. This may involve:

- Creative media - using technology to make or share work, for example: video, audio, virtual reality or Live-streaming.
- Non-arts organisations or settings, such as residential care providers, or a science organisation.
- Health and wellbeing, social inclusion, heritage or sport.

Grants can support projects where the capital-specific expenditure in a project totals less than £100,000. This includes:

- Applications for capital work only, where that capital work will cost up to £100,000.

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- Applications for a mix of activities that include some capital spending where the total cost of the capital work is less than £100,000.

Applications must meet the programme's four criteria: Quality, Public engagement, Finance and Management.

## How To Apply

Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis.

Applications are made using Arts Council England's Grantium system.

- Applications for £30,000 or under are expected to receive a decision in up to 8 weeks.
- Applications for more than £30,000 are expected to receive a decision in at least 12 weeks.

Grants are available for the UK's most talented young instrumentalists in any genre, aged five to 17 years of age who, because of financial need, may be prevented from fulfilling their creative potential.

## Background

Awards for Young Musicians (AYM) is a registered charity. The organisation is the outcome of one man's consuming interest in music: Robert Lewin was a musician and musical instrument collector whose enthusiasm and passion for stringed instruments led him to accumulate a collection of instruments and bows of extraordinary quality.

When Robert Lewin died, he expressed the wish that the gradual disposal of his legacy of valuable musical instruments and memorabilia would provide a source of scholarships for music students. With the encouragement and help of Eleanor Warren, former head of BBC Radio 3 and widely acknowledged international adjudicator, the charity was established in 1998.

## Objectives of Fund

AYM helps musically talented young people from lower-income families overcome the barriers they face to progressing in their music-making and fulfilling their potential. AYM combines individual funding, mentoring and other musical/performance opportunities for young musicians; AYM also helps to improve the wider environment for their progression, through professional development, advocacy and research initiatives.

## Value Notes

Up to £100,000 is awarded each year.

Grants of £100 to £2,000 are available.

As well as providing financial assistance AYM aims to support award winners with the following:

- Mentoring.
- Workshops with professional musicians.
- The chance to observe professional orchestras and other ensembles in rehearsal.
- Free tickets to concerts and performance opportunities.

## Match Funding Restrictions

Applicants may be required to provide the remainder of any costs from alternative sources.

## Who Can Apply

Support is available for instrumentalists making music in any genre.

The key criteria are:

- Instrumentalists must be between the ages of 5 and 17 on 31 August of the Award year.
- Family are struggling to pay for the next key step in the applicant's musical progression.
- Applicants have previously applied for an Award, received an Award or are making a request for the first time.

Award payments are made to institutions, music organisations, music teachers and other suppliers.

The young musician must satisfy one of the following residency conditions:

- The young person has been resident in the British Islands for the past three years.
- The young person is a national of a member state of the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland and is the child of a migrant worker.
- The young person is a refugee or the child of a refugee who has not been ordinarily resident outside the British Islands since being recognised as a refugee or granted leave to enter or remain in the British Islands.

## Location

United Kingdom

## Restrictions

Awards are not available to the following:

- Costs and activities that have already been undertaken or paid for.
- Reimbursements for items already purchased.
- Settling the balance on items paid for on credit.
- Higher education costs.
- Academic school fees (but Saturday music school fees are eligible).
- Foreign ensemble tours.
- International travel for masterclasses or courses.
- Vocal studies.
- If the gross annual family income is over £40,000.

## Eligible Expenditure

AYM aims to help with many of the major costs of music education. Awards can help with costs including the following:

- Instrumental tuition costs.
- Purchasing or hiring of an instrument or computer.
- Access to suitable rehearsal space or making alterations to practise at home.
- Purchasing instrumental accessories such as cases, bows, reeds, light-weight instrument case, etc.
- Fees for long-term music courses such as Saturday school fees.
- Travel for attending long-term music courses (where the young musician has a long journey).
- Purchasing sheet music.
- Exam entry fees.
- Audition fees and associated travel costs.

## How To Apply

Applications may be made at any time.

Applicants must register for an account before applying for the grant.

Submission forms are available to complete online at the AYM website.

Learning disabilities may have a recognised cause, e.g. Down syndrome, Williams syndrome, but often the cause is not known.

Children, young people, and adults with learning disabilities often also have other physical and mental health conditions, disabilities, and/or impairments as well as having learning disabilities.

## Value Notes

The Charity operates the following grant schemes:

- Small Grants: from £250 to £5,000.
- General Grants: over £10,000.

Normally one-off grants are awarded but exceptionally a new project may be funded over two or three years, subject to satisfactory reports of progress.

Appeals received with funding requests of £10,000 and below will initially be considered under the small grants programme and will be referred to the next Main Grant Board Meeting.

## Match Funding Restrictions

The amount of funding available depends on a number of factors including the purpose, the total funding requirement and the potential sources of other funds including, in some cases, matching funding.

## Who Can Apply

Applications will only be considered from voluntary organisations which are registered charities or are associated with a registered charity. Exempt charities such as schools, Parent Teacher Associations and Industrial & Provident Societies can also apply.

The Charity does not usually fund the following:

- Community Interest Companies.
  - Individuals.
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- Hospices.
  - Minibuses, except those for residential and/or day care services for the learning disabled.
  - Advocacy Projects.

  - Swimming and hydro-therapy pools.
  - Physical disabilities, unless accompanied by significant learning disabilities.
  - Research into or care of people with mental illness, dyslexia, dyspraxia, autism nor ADHD, if they do not also have learning disabilities (intellectual disabilities).
  - Acquired brain injury, unless the resulting learning disabilities occur early in the developmental period (ie birth, infancy or childhood), impacting on brain maturation and development and learning in childhood.
  - Qualitative studies.
  - University overheads.
  - University Full Economic Costs.
  - Open access publishing costs.
  - Conference attendance.
  - Anything considered to be statutory.

A second application from an organisation will not normally be considered for a period of at least two years after completion of an initial grant. If the previous application was unsuccessful, this period is one year. This does not apply to recipients of funding through the Research Grants Programme.

## Eligible Expenditure

The main grants and small grants programmes provide funding to aid the care and relief of those affected by learning disability. The Charity will fund projects concerning children and adults with the conditions generally referred to as severe learning difficulties or autism.

Funding is normally considered for capital and revenue costs and for both specific projects and for general running/core costs.

Some examples of the type of project that the Charity might fund are listed below:

- Capital building/renovation/refurbishment works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools.
- Employment schemes, including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture.
- Play schemes and play therapy schemes.
- Day and social activities centres including building costs and running costs.
- Support for families, including respite schemes.
- Independent living schemes.
- Support in the community schemes.
- Snoezelen rooms.

Research grants are directed towards the initiation of research into learning disability with the intention that the research can progress to a point where it becomes eligible for support from other major funding bodies.

## How To Apply

Small grant applications are accepted at any time and will be considered monthly, or as demand decreases.

The deadlines for submitting a General grant for over £10,000 (if both satisfactory references are received) are:

- 1 March for consideration at the June meeting.
- 1 August for consideration at the November meeting.
- 1 December for consideration at the interim meeting in March the following year.

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**Applicants should keep checking the website as submission deadline dates may be subject to change.**

All applications to the fund will be subject to an independent review. Applications should be supported by two referees.

SHINE, a registered charity, was set up in 1999 by a group of philanthropists from the business and finance sectors to support children from low income homes in London so they could excel at school and beyond.

For its first 18 years, SHINE focused its funding and support in areas of deprivation in London. When it started work in London, just 22% of children from disadvantaged backgrounds were achieving the results to enter further education or get high-quality jobs. By 2017, the percentage of children getting good qualifications has doubled. At this point, SHINE decided to leave London and focus on the North of England.

In 2020 SHINE conducted a review of its grant-making strategy and the trustees decided to focus future grant-giving on the following two key priorities:

- Backing early stage ideas developed by teachers and schools, particularly focused on scaling approaches from the grassroots which often struggle to access funding from other sources. This means expanding the focus on Let Teachers SHINE and on the direct funding programmes for schools: Ready for School, Bridging the Gap and Flying High.
- Working together with others to solve some of the more intractable problems which hold back children's educational outcomes, in particular looking to resolve barriers beyond the school gates. Through this theme, SHINE will choose specific parts of the North of England where it wants to work on a proactive basis to solve a specific issue, in collaboration with other charities, universities and community groups.

## Objectives of Fund

SHINE's current work is with schools with ideas with real potential to effect educational change across the North of England (the North East, North West or Yorkshire & Humber regions).

## Value Notes

The normal range of grant funding for the full duration of a two to three year project is around £20,000 and £100,000.

## Match Funding Restrictions

Preference is usually given to projects with some match funding in place. This can, however, be in the form of 'in-kind' funding, eg, a school being willing to cover the cost of some teacher time or space for a project to take place, or contributions of time or resources from an organisation. In light of the current coronavirus/COVID-19 situation the Foundation will be more flexible when considering requests for e-readers and electronic reading resources, however a strong case for support and explanation of need will have to be made within the application.

The Foundation will also consider contributions towards library software, necessary IT equipment and furniture etc. in order to create a suitable library space, although ideally the majority of funding should be requested for books/reading materials.

- Costs for exchange partners to take part in relevant joint activities while the group is in Germany.
- Materials and room hire.
- Visa costs directly related to project visits.
- Virtual/digital activities. (The grant can be partially used towards software, hardware or hardware rental but cannot cover more than 75% of the cost of any such items.)

Up to 25% of the total grant can be used for organisational support, including:

- Admin costs directly linked to the project implementation, eg supply cover, postage.
- Insurance.

## How To Apply

The programme has a rolling deadline. However, applications must be received by at least six weeks in advance of the visit. Applications must be made by the travelling institution.

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Application forms and guidance are available to download from the UK-German Connection website. Applications should be submitted by email.

Organisations should contact UK-German Connection if they want to discuss their project idea.

Frederick Thorpe formed Ulverscroft Large Print Books Limited in 1964 as a non-profit-making organisation to republish standard books in large print for sale to public libraries. Ulverscroft Large Print Books Limited acquired other large print book publishing groups over the years to form the Ulverscroft Group.

The Foundation sits alongside the Group to help develop charitable projects for the benefit of the visually impaired. Its objectives are to:

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- Relieve and assist, and to provide treatment and education for sick or handicapped persons and in particular persons suffering from defective eyesight.
  - Support medical research and to provide and assist in the provision of facilities for the treatment or alleviation of sick or visually handicapped persons.

## Objectives of Fund

The Foundation provides grants to eye clinics, hospitals, schools, libraries and other organisations helping visually impaired people in the UK and overseas. It also funds medical research and the provision of facilities for the treatment or alleviation of visual impairment.

## Value Notes

Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. Grants range from around £100 to £500,000.

## Match Funding Restrictions

The Foundation will take into account any other sources of funding that applicants are able to access. Applicants must provide details of any other funding received or pledged for the project in question, and the names of other organisations to which they have applied.

## Who Can Apply

Applications are accepted from any organisations that help the visually impaired in the UK or overseas. Organisations need not necessarily be a charity and can be a community interest company (CIC) or social group and could include:

- National and local blind and partially sighted societies
- Schools and colleges for visually impaired people
- Sports and social organisations for visually impaired people

Applications from public libraries run by local authorities will be considered if these are additional to the local authority's core service. Volunteer-run libraries may be supported if they are supported in cash or in kind by the local authority.

Eligible organisations must have:

- An appropriate safeguarding policy in place for vulnerable children and/or adults and have procedures to implement and monitor the policy.
- An equal opportunities policy, which is regularly monitored and reviewed.

## Location

United Kingdom and overseas

## Restrictions

Generally, the Foundation does not fund staff salaries or ongoing running costs for an organisation. (Staffing costs for specific, time-limited projects may be considered at the Trustees' discretion. Research projects which involve salary costs may also be considered.)

It is highly unlikely to support public libraries run by private companies.

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It will not support other charities that could be considered to be doing similar work - for example, funding research projects.

## Eligible Expenditure

Grants are available for costs associated with projects to improve or enhance services that will benefit people with significant visual impairments. Preference will be given to projects that will lead to longer-term benefits after the initial funding has ended.

Eligible costs can include equipment or materials. Staffing costs for specific, time-limited projects may be considered at the Trustees' discretion.

Applications for funding to support academic and clinical research will also be considered. In evaluating bids the Trustees will take into account the predicted clinical benefits and the timescale for achieving them, as well as the proposals for disseminating research results to the wider sector.

## How To Apply

The Trustees consider appeals in January, April, July and October each year. Application deadlines are the 15th day of the previous month - 15 December, 15 March, 15 June and 15 September.

Applications can be made in writing by post or email or via the Trust's online application form and should include the following:

- Details of the current service, if any, that the applicant organisation provides to the visually impaired and how this will be improved or enhanced by the proposed project.
- An estimate of how many visually impaired people currently use organisation's service, and how many will use it in the future.
- Details of any other funding obtained and the names of other organisations that have been applied to.
- A copy of the applicant's latest annual report and accounts.
- Confirmation that the organisation has a safeguarding policy for vulnerable children and/or adults, as appropriate.
- Confirmation that the organisation has an equal opportunities policy.

**Grants are available for local authorities, charities and community groups in England to celebrate, commemorate and/or educate about the history of the MV Empire Windrush and the contribution of the Windrush Generation to British economic, social and cultural life.**

## Background

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MV Empire Windrush arrived at the Port of Tilbury on 21 June 1948 and its passengers disembarked a day later. The ship carried several hundred Caribbean migrants, many of them veterans of the Second World War. Since then, the Windrush has come to symbolise the first movement of mass migration to the United Kingdom in the post-war era. 2018 marked the 70th anniversary of MV Empire Windrush's arrival.

The Government announced a national Windrush Day on 22 June each year, commencing in 2019 and following 70th anniversary celebrations in 2018. This is backed by funding from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG). The Department opened an annual grant process which local authorities, charities and community groups can bid into.

The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) was renamed the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) in late September 2021.

## Objectives of Fund

The Windrush Day Grant Scheme is part of the Government's work to create more resilient communities, where different religions, cultures and opinions are celebrated, underpinned by a shared set of values that champion tolerance, freedom and equality of opportunity.

The funding is for local authorities, charities and community groups to run a community led project seeking to celebrate, commemorate and educate people about the Windrush Generation and their contribution to British economic, social and cultural life. This includes those who arrived on the ship, their contemporaries and descendants.

## Value Notes

The total funding pot is £500,000.

The following grants are available:

- Tier 1: smaller projects between £5,000 and £25,000.
- Tier 2: larger projects between £25,000 and £50,000.

Applicants seeking fewer than £5,000 should contact their local authority to explore the possibility of joining a larger bid.

## Match Funding Restrictions

A minimum of 10% of cash or in-kind match funding is required.

## Who Can Apply

Local authorities, registered charities/community interest companies or community groups with a charitable purpose can apply.

Local authorities may include a county council; a district council; a parish council; a combined authority; a London borough council; or another organisation set out in section 33(1) of the Local Government Act 2003. Schools, libraries and other local authority organisations are encouraged to submit bids in conjunction with their local authority.

Other groups that would like to apply must:

- Be registered charities, exempt charities or Community Interest Companies OR meet all the following criteria:

- They are established for charitable, benevolent or philanthropic purposes;
- They have a governing body with at least three members;
- They have a governing document which they are able to produce; and
- They can provide accounts demonstrating good financial health across both of the last two financial years.

Organisations must also have a proven track record of working directly with communities and the project proposal must be significantly influenced by the community itself.

A group of bidders can also apply.

## Eligible Expenditure

22 June marks National Windrush Day and projects must include an activity on this date. Events and activities can take place over a longer period, but all projects must be completed by 31 December 2022.

Projects in 2022 need to support the central aims of Windrush Day – to tell the story of the Windrush Generation and celebrate and recognise how they have shaped Britain's heritage. Projects should be rooted in communities and involve the Windrush Generation descendants in as many areas as possible as well as those from different age groups and background.

Tier 1 Projects may include:

- Public celebrations and community activities.
- Education through culturally relevant activities and events.
- Exchange visits and programmes.
- Religious services.
- Arts projects.
- Cultural programmes.

Tier 2 Projects may include:

- Bringing together local partners and communities to create an artistic project.
- Running a short-term scheme to support young descendants of the Windrush community and young people from other backgrounds to improve their academic, vocational or entrepreneurial skills.
- Running a range of unique and high-profile events/activities in partnership with local schools, museums and libraries.

Funding can cover project costs. Organisations should not allow more than 25% of their bid to cover staff costs associated with running the project.

## How To Apply

The deadline to apply is 18 March 2022. Decisions are expected in May 2022.

Since 1983 Wooden Spoon has given over £29 million to more than 1,300 projects and benefited more than one million people.

The funding is for projects that enhance the quality of life of children and young people in the UK who are mentally, socially or physically disadvantaged. This could be through sensory rooms, specialist playgrounds and sports activity areas, respite, medical and community care.

## Objectives of Fund

Wooden Spoon's objective is to make a positive impact on the lives of disadvantaged children and young people through its commitment to quality charitable work throughout the UK.

## Value Notes

There is neither a minimum nor maximum grant level. However, it is unlikely that a project of a physical nature that is under £5,000 will have sufficient substance and scale to qualify.

Applicants should note that given the pandemic situation, the amount of available funding has been reduced.

## Match Funding Restrictions

Applicants are encouraged to contribute a percentage of the funds required.

## Who Can Apply

Organisations and charities in the UK are eligible to apply.

Wooden Spoon can only make grants to organisations with a legal status. For example, schools, charities, and private members clubs.

Applications from groups working in partnership are eligible but one organisation must take the lead for the application and be the primary beneficiary and point of contact.

Funding is not normally available for the following:

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- Computers and electronic equipment.
  - Minibus or similar vehicle projects.
  - Revenue expenditure.
  - Individuals.
  - Salaries, administration costs, professional fees and on-going overheads related to a capital project.

## Eligible Expenditure

Wooden Spoon supports projects which will benefit children and young people under 25 years of age who are disadvantaged physically, mentally or socially. Projects must normally be of a capital nature, with a reasonably long-term prospective lifetime.

The funding is for projects that address the following areas:

- Health and wellbeing
- Sensory rooms and gardens
- Specialist equipment and facilities
- Playgrounds and outdoor activities
- Education projects

If a project is a physical, tangible asset of a permanent nature, the following must apply:

- It must have a minimum predicted life span of five years (preferably ten), be non-transferable and of a permanent nature. Special consideration may be given to funding life-enhancing/medical equipment if it can be shown that the useable life of such equipment is likely to be at least five years.
- Grants will not be considered for salaries, administration costs, professional fees and on-going overheads related to a capital project.

If a project is educational or disability sports-focused, the following must apply:

- There must be a key rugby element to engage children and young people.
- It must have a clearly-defined brief detailing the project's need and objectives; stakeholders; description of participants (age, gender, geography); recruitment of participants; project activity and budget; legacy planning; monitoring and evaluation and mechanism for reporting to Wooden Spoon.
- Grants will be considered for kit and equipment, salaries and administration costs.

Projects must:

- Enhance and support the lives of children and young people (under the age of 25) who are disadvantaged physically, mentally or socially.
- Work directly with children and young people and have a positive influence on their lives as a result of the activities or service provided.
- Benefit those located in the UK or Ireland.
- Support a group.

## How To Apply

With the current situation, much of Wooden Spoon's fundraising has been put on hold and therefore the available funding for projects has been reduced.

The funder suggests as a first step groups complete the online expression of wish form for an initial assessment.

Applications may be submitted at any time and are available to download from the Wooden Spoon website.

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The completed form should be returned by either email or post. Once checked against the criteria, the application form will be forwarded to the regional committee for approval. If the region agrees to support the project an inspector will undertake a site visit and report back to the Project Committee which meets monthly. Successful applications will go forward to the next quarterly Council meeting. The applicant will receive a formal grant letter, if the project is approved by Council.

Applications requesting a small fraction of the cost of a large project (eg £10,000 towards a £300,000 initiative) are unlikely to be successful, as the Charity aims to put its money where it will have the most impact.

## Eligible Expenditure

All eligible projects must make use of IT, and the Charity is more likely to fund projects which demonstrate an innovative use of IT, can be developed into a model for wider replication, are sustainable and focus on outcomes which can be formally reported on.

Projects must fall under one of the four priority areas:

- Enhancing opportunity for young people through more effective education.
- Improving the quality of life for those who are disadvantaged, disabled or socially excluded.
- Helping charities and other not-for-profit organisations get the best out of IT.
- Improving the public's understanding of IT and its capabilities.

Grants are restricted and applicants should expect to report to the Charity on the outcomes.

## How To Apply

Applications can be submitted any time throughout the year and are considered by the Charitable Operations Committee at its four meetings each year (in February, May, September and November).
