Stand Up Speak Out

Make a Difference

Stand Up, Speak Out, Make a Difference is a peer education programme that addresses challenging and controversial issues of importance to young people. This includes discussion of human rights, prejudice, discrimination and extremism, and how young people can use their voices in constructive ways. The programme is delivered in partnership with the *Anne Frank Trust* and *Remembering Srebrenica*.

We are inviting eight secondary schools to take part in SUSOMAD during the 2018-2019 academic year. In order to sustain the impact and quality of the programme, we are asking schools to make a contribution of £600 towards the delivery of the project. In return, schools will receive:

- Training for staff and up to 20 peer guides based on the *History for Today* and *Remembering Srebrenica* exhibitions (see page 2)
- Hire of each exhibition in school for between one and two weeks
- Free To Be workshops in schools over two days
- Ambassador programme for up to ten pupils





Phase 1 Exhibitions and Peer Guide Training

The *Anne Frank: A History for Today* exhibition presents the story of Anne and her family as well as the wider context of the Holocaust and the political and military developments in Europe between 1932 and 1945. The narrative running through the exhibition provides a context for us to raise awareness of:

- the rise of Nazism and the dismantling of democracy
- the courage of the helpers and resisters
- victimhood - the fate of those targeted by extremism and violence
- the deliberate and organised nature of genocide
- modern day extreme right wing political activity in Europe
- examples of racism and injustice in Britain today
- the need for social responsibility and human rights
- the benefits of positive citizenship and community cohesion



Despite an overwhelming feeling that an event such as the Holocaust must never happen again, in July 1995 over 8,000 Muslim men and boys were murdered on the outskirts of Srebrenica, which was supposedly a safe haven.

The exhibition is divided into sections which explore:

- the heritage of ethnic and religious integration in the former Yugoslavia
- disintegration following the fall of communism in Eastern Europe
- the Bosnian war and the siege of Sarajevo
- the role of the United Nations as peace keepers in Srebrenica
- genocide, war crimes and the search for peace



Phase 2

Free to Be

The Free to Be Programme

Free to Be is a series of anti-discrimination workshops covering the themes of Islamophobia, gender expectations and homophobia . The workshops are delivered in school over one or two days by staff from Bradford Council and the Anne Frank Trust. Pupils are encouraged to develop their critical thinking skills and show empathy for others. The issues covered are ones affecting young people today and as such, the Free to Be programme complements the learning from the *Remembering Srebrenica* and *History for Today* exhibitions. Workshops last two hours but can be shortened for groups who have visited the *History for Today* exhibition.

SUSOMAD Ambassadors

Six to ten children who have take part in the Free to Be workshops are chosen to be your school’s SUSOMAD Ambassadors. Supported by a film maker, staff from Bradford Council and the Anne Frank Trust they will produce a short film and a workshop or assembly for delivery in school. This will enable the young people to showcase their skills and disseminate their learning. The film will serve as a legacy for use in future years as part of the school’s SMSC curriculum.

Service Level Agreement

Bradford Council will:

- Supply the *Anne Frank: A History for Today* and *Remembering Srebrenica* exhibitions
- Train up to 20 young people as peer guides
- Deliver the Free to Be programme as outlined in this brochure
- Invoice you at the subsidised rate of £600 per school

Your school will:

- Nominate a lead teacher to work with Bradford Council throughout the SUSOMAD programme
- Host the exhibitions in school, taking reasonable precautions to prevent damage to the exhibitions
- Support the delivery of the programme by encouraging pupils to participate as described
- Contribute £600 towards the cost of the training, workshops and exhibition hire

Confirmation of booking

Your booking must be signed by the head teacher or a person authorised by the head teacher to agree to the participation of both pupils and staff, and to the financial contribution.
