Stand Up, Speak Out, Make a Difference

for secondary schools is a peer education programme that tackles issues including human rights, prejudice, discrimination and extremism, and explores ways in which young people can use their voice constructively for society. The programme is delivered in partnership with the Anne Frank Trust and Remembering Srebrenica, and consists of:

- Training for staff and up to 20 peer educators on the Anne Frank: A History for Today and Remembering Srebrenica exhibitions.
- The loan of each exhibition for up to two weeks including delivery and collection.
- The Anne Frank Trust's 'Free to Be' workshops, with a focus on identity-based bullying, delivered to a KS3 year group.

Anne Frank: A History for Today presents the story of Anne and her family and other victims of the Holocaust, as well as the political and military developments in Europe between 1932 and 1945. It provides a context for learning about:

- the dismantling of democracy and the rise of dictatorship
- the motivation of allies and resisters, and the role of bystanders
- the deliberate and organised nature of genocide
- modern day prejudice, discrimination and political extremism
- the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

The Remembering Srebrenica exhibition

tells of the murder of over 8,000 Muslim men and boys in the Bosnian town of Srebrenica in July 1995. This happened despite the United Nations' presence and despite protestations from the international community that genocide such as that perpetrated against the Jews during the Holocaust must never be repeated. The exhibition also speaks of other modern genocides such as Darfur and Rwanda, and is regularly updated.



Service Level Agreement

Bradford Council will:

- Supply the Anne Frank: A History for Today and Remembering Srebrenica exhibitions
- Train up to 20 young people as peer guides
- Deliver the Free to Be workshops over 2 days
- Offer the whole programme at a subsidised rate of £600 per school.

Your school will:

- Nominate a lead teacher to work with Bradford Council officers
- Host the exhibitions in school, taking reasonable precautions to prevent damage to them
- Support the delivery of the programme by encouraging pupils to participate
- Contribute £600 towards the cost of the training, workshops and exhibition hire.

Confirmation of booking

Your booking must be signed by the head teacher or a person authorised by the head teacher to agree to the participation of both pupils and staff, and to the financial contribution.
